

Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education Policy July 2019

Policy review date: September 2020

This policy was developed in response to Sex and Relationship Education Guidance DfES 2000, Draft DFE Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education, July 2018, the DFE consultation response to Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education, February 2018. The policy has also been informed by the National Teenage Pregnancy Strategy, PSHE Association guidelines and The National Healthy Schools Programme.

1. The Consultation Process has involved:

- Review of SRE curriculum content by Assistant Head Teacher with responsibility for Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education.
- Consultation with school governors

2. Definition of Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education.

The School bases its definition of Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education on guidance from the government DFE draft Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education: Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education is education that will enable students to make informed decisions about their wellbeing, health and relationships. Sex education should ensure that students are able to make sound decisions when facing risks, challenges and complex contexts. Sex Education should enable students to know how and when to ask for help.

The two areas to be covered are:

Relationship and sex education Physical and mental wellbeing

3. Aims

Students should be able to:

- Develop skills and understanding about the value of loving, diverse and stable relationships.
 Students should be able to make safe choices and understand the difference between safe and unsafe behaviour.
- Understand what is acceptable and non-acceptable behaviour in a range of relationships.
- Understand what is meant by relationships and what constitutes healthy relationships; this includes friendship groups
- Know their rights, responsibilities and opportunities online; including acceptable behaviour on line
- Know the laws relating to sexual consent, exploitation, abuse, grooming and coercion
- Know how to recognise positive aspects of healthy one to one relationships.

4. Subject content

Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education in secondary school should build on that learned in the primary school content.

- Relationship and sex education will cover: Families, Respectful relationships, Online and the media, Being safe and Intimate and Sexual relationships, including Sexual Health.
- Physical and mental wellbeing will cover: Mental wellbeing, Internet safety and harms, Physical health and fitness, Healthy eating, Drugs, alcohol and tobacco, Health and prevention, Basic first aid and Changing adolescent body.

5. Delivery of Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education.

Much of Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education will be delivered in Personal, Social. Health Education (PSHE), Science and Religious Studies. However, several of the themes will also be explored in subjects such as English, Drama and Computer Science. Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education will be primarily delivered by the student's form tutor as they will have knowledge of the student's individual circumstances. Cleeve Park School will also use external health professionals where appropriate.

6. Inclusion

Sexual Identity and Sexual Orientation:

We aim to deal sensitively and honesty with issues of sexual orientation, answer appropriate question and offer support. Young people, whatever their developing sexuality need to feel that sex and relationship education is relevant to them.

7. SEND

Cleeve Park School will ensure that Relationships Education, Relationships and sex and Health will be accessible to all students. This includes those with SEN needs, physical disabilities, social, emotional and mental health needs. That there will be high- quality planning and differentiation. The Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education will prepare them for adult life. Content and teaching may be tailored to specific needs; it will recognise that students with special educational needs can be particularity vulnerable to exploitation and other issues.

8. Sensitive or controversial topics

Issues of sexual orientation and abortion will be delivered through Religious Studies where a range of religious and non-religious viewpoints will be discussed in a sensitive non-judgemental way. Any Relationships Education, Relationships and sex and Health lesson may consider questions or issues that some students will find sensitive. Before embarking on these lessons, ground rules will be established, which prohibit inappropriate personal information being requested or disclosed by those taking part in the lesson. When students ask questions, we aim to answer them honestly, within the ground rules established at the start of the sessions. When it is felt that answering a specific question would involve information at a level inappropriate to the development of the rest of the students, the question may be dealt with individually at another time. Any concern regarding discussions about sexual activity or abuse will be referred to The Safeguarding team.

9. Right to withdraw

Parents have the right to withdraw their child from some or all of sex education when it is delivered as part of Sex and Relationship education but not from Science lessons. Any parent wishing to withdraw their child from all or part of RSE should discuss this with their child's Head of Year at the earliest possible convenience.

10. Safeguarding, reports of abuse and confidentiality

Staff cannot offer unconditional confidentiality. Please refer to the school Safeguarding Policy regarding our reporting procedures.

In a case where a teacher learns from a student under 16-years-old that they are having or contemplating sexual intercourse:

- The young person will be persuaded, wherever possible, to talk to parent/carer and if necessary to seek medical advice.
- Child Protection issues will be considered, and referred if necessary to the teacher responsible for Child Protection under the school's procedures.
- The young person will be properly counselled about contraception, including precise information about where young people can access contraception and advice services.

Health professionals in school are bound by their codes of conduct in a one-to-one situation with an individual student, but in a classroom situation they must follow the school's Safeguarding policy and reporting any concerns they have to the appropriate person.

8. Monitoring and Evaluation of Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education

Where Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education is delivered in PSHE, the PSHE Co-ordinators have responsibility to oversee and organise the monitoring and evaluation of PSHE in the context of the overall school plans for monitoring the quality of teaching and learning. The PSHE programme will be treated as a subject department in this exercise, i.e. all departments undertake yearly self-evaluation and half- termly drop-ins to assess the quality of teaching and learning in these sessions.

The Governors Business Committee is responsible for overseeing, reviewing and organising the revision of Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex and Health Education policy.

Ofsted is required to evaluate and report on spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of students. This includes evaluating and commenting on the school's sex and relationship education policy, and on support and staff development, training and delivery.

Delivery of Relationship Education, Relationships and Sex Education and Health Education

Cleeve Park School will ensure that each topic is delivered age appropriately. This may mean that topics are revisited but the content of the topic will be different.
